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EDITORIAL

Low-cost Improvised Teaching Aids

India is a land of villages wherein about 75% of Primary School are located. These rural schools generally suffer badly for want of adequate funds to procure the equipment and teaching aids available in the market. Low- cost teaching aids are made out of the material available in the natural environment in the neighbourhood of the schools using the local artisans and technology rather than machines. It is important for the teachers to know how to prepare, use and evaluate the low-cost improvised teaching aids so that their classroom transaction becomes meaningful and effective.

Low- cost teaching aids are prepared with simple materials costing very little by involving the children and the artisans. There are some inexpensive and waste materials available locally such as empty matchstick boxes, fused electric bulbs, cans, seeds, shells etc. Improvised aids include charts, models and other inexpensive aids which can be prepared easily with little, or no money to make learning effective, comprehensive and interesting.

The teacher is the key person in the entire process of preparing improvised teaching aids. He may involve the artisans and the children while preparing aids. He has to take the initiative in procuring the material, give an idea about the aid required and plan its preparation to conduct the experiment in a scientific way.

The objective of preparing and using a teaching aid is to improve the teaching - learning

does not match with the global Quality standards. Hence, there is enough justification for an increased assessment of the Quality of the country's educational institutions. Traditionally, these institutions assumed that Quality could be determined by their internal resources, viz., faculty with an impressive set of degrees and experience, number of books and journals in the library etc., or by its definable and assessable outputs. But this view of determining Quality in higher education, popularly termed as the "value-addition" approach, does not measure the competencies students develop through the courses offered. The competencies are recall, understanding, and problem solving.

Institutes of higher education, through their curriculum, are expected to provide knowledge, know-how, wisdom, and character to the students. If the teaching and learning process conforms to their ideas about what is Quality education, students enjoy learning. Teachers need to discuss such questions with the students as: Why are you here? What are you trying to do? What does it mean to you? How the teacher can help you in doing it well? A teacher has to build up a consensus in a class regarding what constitutes a Quality experience. Once a mutually agreed purpose is established, education is improved, productivity of teachers is enhanced, and teachers and students find greater joy in their work and are able to make positive contributions to the society. It is, therefore necessary that the institutes of higher education accept the mantra of 'Quality' and provide for a standardized assessment of what exactly the students are able to do (that they were not able to do before) as a result of their education.

Students' learning can be improved if the teacher's attention is essentially focused on the teaching/learning process and not so much on their examination results. Measures taken by the academic institutions to standardize their syllabi

The overall scenario of higher education in India and align their curriculum could constitute Quality. Unfortunately, the course curriculum is so strongly oriented towards testing and examination that the teacher's preparation is undermined and rendered ineffective. Examination results should only help the teacher and the student to jointly decide how to improve the educational processes in the classrooms. We need to turn our attention to a more fundamental issue: What are we trying to do? What are we looking for? What do we expect from our institutes of education? Most of the Quality Standards for accreditation state that assessment principles are complementary to the institute's mission. Clearly defined mission, goals, and objectives guide faculty, administration, staff, and governing bodies in making decisions related to planning, resource allocation, programmes and curriculum development, and definition of programme outcomes. These goals and objectives should focus on student learning, other outcomes, and institutional improvement.

> In general, both the faculty and the administration believe that Quality measures should be implemented in their institution, but the movement suffers because of their considerably different perceptions. The administrators may feel that they are already doing those kinds of things in their curriculum and outcomes assessment merely establishes criteria for success and making any additional changes are not essential. But the faculty's perspective is quite different, as some of them feel that there has to be a continuous campaign of reinforcement from the top administrators, that they are totally committed to Quality implementation and assessment programmes. Teachers and administrators require special competencies, both knowledge and know-how, for implementing Quality management practices. Persistent culture of resistance can be handled by convincing people to change their long held values, beliefs, and attitudes and adopt new ones, which produce long-lasting positive effects.

process. To fulfil the need, it is essential to understand the basic concepts of teaching and the methodology of teaching. Many concepts can be explained through simple experiments with objects available in the environment or brought from own houses. The concept of "Pressure of Air" can be demonstrated with experiment that just requires a glass, water and piece of cardboard/sheet. Making a chart would be meaningful only when some other aspects of pressure are to be explained which cannot be demonstrated in such a simple way.

To do all this requires special efforts by the teacher. To collect different materials and to get models prepared by local craftsmen require certain capabilities on the part of the teacher. He may be familiar with the different teaching aids, but it is one thing to be familiar with them and quite another to

know the use to which these can be put or to have the skill to prepare a teaching aid. Teaching aids would be effective and meaningful only when producer of such aids is aware of the following:-

- a) The value of good teaching.
- b) Knowledge of the subject matter.
- c) The learning potential of the learners.
- d) The basic principles of the content and the process of learning.
- e) The relationship of the content with the environment.
- f) Local resources, including human resources.
- g) Interest in the subject and the learners.

Constitution of Tutorial Groups

All the students admitted to the B.Ed. course Session 2012-13, in Vimal Muni College of Education, were divided into various Tutorial Groups. Each group comprising 10-12 students was placed under the charge of a faculty member. The main objective of formation of such groups is to develop an intimate relationship between the teacher and the taught.
